Project Is Realized Largely Through
The Efforts Of Miss Louise
Scott, Local Regent

"Memory Lane", a tribute to this community from the Daughters of the American Revolution was officially dedicated at the Olathe Cemetery last Wednesday afternoon at four-thirty o'clock.

The project, which was sponsored by the Olathe chapter was realized largely through the efforts of Miss Louise Scott who worked untiringly in the raising of funds for the purchase of 43 hard maple trees and a red granite boulder with a bronze plaque with the dedicatory inscription. As regent Miss Scott has contributed much of her time and energy for a most successful administration.

The row of hard maples which comprise the "Memory Lane" run from the World War monument east and north on both sides of the road to the Civil War veterans monument, and are planted on both sides of the road. Small American flags were planted at the base of each of the trees for the dedication program and the Olathe Boy Scouts assisted in making it a most impressive ceremony.

Miss Scott presided at the exercises and gave an excellent talk on the purpose and ideals of the organization and the history of "Memory Lane". Mrs. Ted Jones, chairman of the "Memory Lane" committee, made the presentation to the city and it was accepted by Commissioner J. J. Lehman in the absence of Mayor Don M. Ashlock. Mrs. E. P. Pendleton, Kansas state regent of the D. A. R. made the dedicatory address.

A "Call To Remembrance" was given by Mrs. George Hodges who gave her talk in memory of three departed members, Mrs. Rebecca Robinson, Miss Maude Robinson, and Mrs. Dell Pratt Stephens. A large green wreath at the base of the boulder held a lily which was placed there by Misses Frances Hodges and Gwendolyn Jones in memory of each departed daughter.

A quartette composed of Superintendent N. I. Reist, Ted Jones, Harry Buchholtz and W. G. Shinn sang "There Is No Death". The services were closed with a prayer by Mrs. J. R. Newton.
